Students in all sections of Small Business Management/Entrepreneurship will be required to do the following:

- 1. Students will read assigned chapters and watch assigned videos.
- 2. Students will complete assignments that include quizzes, discussions, and self-assessments.
- 3. Students will complete a three-part business plan project.
- 4. Students will complete online objective exams.

**Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery:** Students in both the traditional class and in the Internet class will have access to this course via Canvas. Students in the traditional class will meet regularly for lecture over the material. Students in the Internet class will only be required to meet with the instructor for testing; however, Internet students are always welcome to attend the traditional class when available (especially for exam reviews).

All assignments and exams will be submitted through Canvas. After an assignment has been graded, the student will be able to view his or her grade by returning to the assignment or by clicking Grades in the left banner. Students will have limited review of the answers to the exams, but they will always be able to view the score. Work is generally graded and posted within seven days following the deadline.

Students in both the traditional and Internet classes should use People within Canvas to communicate with the instructor. Using Canvas email gives you access to the instructor and other classmates without having to remember or type email addresses—you just select a name from the list. If you are not able to contact your instructor using email in Canvas, you may use his or her Panola College email address. Panola College instructors attempt to respond to all messages and emails within 24 hours, excluding holidays and weekends. Please always include a subject line and your name in your email.

# **Major Assignments/Assessments:**

The following items will be assigned and assessed during the semester and used to calculate the student's final grade:

### Assignments

Assignments will require completion of selected exercises at the ends of chapters. Assignments will include self-assessments, quizzes, and discussions. Always check the Assignments link or review the weekly module to determine specific requirements. The assignment will be graded on

the same assignment page. Homework is due as assigned and 10 points will be deducted for each day work is late—with a maximum of two days allowed for late submissions.

Caution: Passing off another's work as your own or allowing anyone to pass off your own work as his or her own is not tolerated. Stiff penalties apply, including exclusion from the class with a grade of "F" assigned for the semester! Be sure all work you submit is your own!

### Business Plan

You will complete three business plan assignments. First, you will create a business plan for a potential future business using Chat GPT that includes Executive Summary, Company Description, Market Analysis, Organization and Management Plan, Service and Product Line, Marketing and Sales Plan, Funding Request, and Financial Projections sections.

Second, you will create an implementation strategy for your business plan. You will answer questions regarding funding sources, marketing, human resources, and operations, potential challenges, and opportunities. You will also create ten steps you would need to complete to start implementing your plan.

For the final part of your business plan, you will create a pitch presentation using the presentation software of your choice (i.e. PowerPoint, Canva, Google Slides). You will create a presentation of 10-25 slides that will simply your business plan into a short, easy-to-understand version.

#### Exams

Two objective exams covering Chapters 1-15 will be given during the semester: mid-term exam and final exam. Tests will be administered online in Canvas using Proctorio which provides a video/audio recording of your testing experience for the instructor. You will take the exams at home using the webcam on your computer; if you do not have a webcam, you may take the exams at one of the Panola College testing centers in Carthage, Center, or Marshall. If you are unable to take a test when it is scheduled, you must reschedule the test with the instructor <a href="PRIOR">PRIOR</a> to the testing date. An excused absence and makeup test may be granted for sudden illness or unforeseen circumstances.

### **Course Grade:**

The grading scale for this course is as follows:

- Assignments 50%
- Business Plan 20%
- Exams 30%

All student grades including a mid-semester and final grade will be posted to Grades in Canvas.

Cheating is defined as unauthorized help on an examination or assigned course material. A student must not submit another student's work as his or her own. A student must not receive from any other student or give to any other student any information, answers, or help during an exam. A student must not "steal" the answers from an unsuspecting student during an exam. A student must not use any sources for answers during an exam (including but not limited to notes, books, or electronic devices) without prior authorization from the professor. A student must not obtain exam questions illegally, tamper with the exam questions, nor change the results of an exam after it has been graded. A student must not use AI on assignments or exams unless given permission to do so. All cheating infractions will result in a grade of "0" for the assignment.

Plagiarism is defined as the taking of a person's ideas, words, or information and claiming those properties as one's own. The use of all ideas, words, or information from any source must be properly referenced and due credit must be given to its author. All written assignments must be submitted through Canvas which uses turnitin.com to calculate percent originality of the submission. For compositions, a student's work should show 0% plagiarism. The instructor reserves the right to employ other means outside of turnitin.com to check the "originality" of a student's work. Any submission that contains copied material (other than cited material in a research paper) will automatically receive a grade of "0" for the assignment.

A student will fail the class upon his or her second cheating and/or plagiarism offense. These policies shall be adhered to unless mitigating circumstances should prove a lesser penalty should apply. Students shall have the right to contest a cheating or plagiarism claim; the appeals process is specifically defined in the student handbook.

#### Attendance:

Students in the face-to-face class are expected to arrive on time and remain in class until the class is over as random movement into, out of, or around the classroom is disruptive and disrespectful. Students are highly encouraged to participate in class by asking questions and engaging in discussions. Disruptive class behavior will result in dismissal from the classroom and an absent mark on the attendance record. Persistent, disruptive behavior may ultimately result in dismissal from the course, a failing grade, and further disciplinary actions in accordance with college policy.

Make up assignments/exams will only be granted in accord with the excused absence policy.

A student that chooses to NOT finish the course must complete the withdrawal procedure in the Student Success office in order to receive a "W." Otherwise, the student will receive a grade at the end of the semester commensurate with the work completed.

# **SCANS CRITERIA**

- 1) Foundation skills are defined in three areas: basic skills, thinking skills, and personal qualities.
  - a) **Basic Skills**: A worker must read, write, perform arithmetic and mathematical operations, listen, and speak effectively. These skills include:
    - i) Reading: locate, understand, and interpret written information in prose and in documents such as manuals, graphs, and schedules.
    - ii) Writing: communicate thoughts, ideas, information, and messages in writing, and create documents such as letters, directions, manuals, reports, graphs, and flow charts.
    - iii) Arithmetic and Mathematical Operations: perform basic computations and approach practical problems by choosing appropriately from a variety of mathematical techniques.
    - iv) Listening: receive, attend to, interpret, and respond to verbal messages and other cues.
    - v) Speaking: Organize ideas and communicate orally.
  - b) **Thinking Skills**: A worker must think creatively, make decisions, solve problems, visualize, know how to learn, and reason effectively. These skills include:
    - i) Creative Thinking: generate new ideas.
    - ii) Decision Making: specify goals and constraints, generate alternatives, consider risks, and evaluate and choose the best alternative.
    - iii) Problem Solving: recognize problems and devise and implement plan of action.
    - iv) Visualize ("Seeing Things in the Mind's Eye"): organize and process symbols, pictures, graphs, objects, and other information.
    - v) Knowing How to Learn: use efficient learning techniques to acquire and apply new knowledge and skills.
    - vi) Reasoning: discover a rule or principle underlying the relationship between two or more objects and apply it when solving a problem.
  - c) **Personal Qualities**: A worker must display responsibility, self-esteem, sociability, self-management, integrity, and honesty.
    - i) Responsibility: exert a high level of effort and persevere toward goal attainment.
    - ii) Self-Esteem: believe in one's own self-worth and maintain a positive view of oneself.
    - iii) Sociability: demonstrate understanding, friendliness, adaptability, empathy, and politeness in group settings.
    - iv) Self-Management: assess oneself accurately, set personal goals, monitor progress, and exhibit self-control.
    - v) Integrity and Honesty: choose ethical courses of action.
- 2) Workplace competencies are defined in five areas: resources, interpersonal skills, information, systems, and technology.
  - a) **Resources**: A worker must identify, organize, plan, and allocate resources effectively.
    - Time: select goal-relevant activities, rank them, allocate time, and prepare and follow schedules.
    - ii) Money: Use or prepare budgets, make forecasts, keep records, and make adjustments to meet objectives.
    - iii) Material and Facilities: Acquire, store, allocate, and use materials or space efficiently. Examples: construct a decision time line chart; use computer software to plan a project; prepare a budget; conduct a cost/benefits analysis; design an RFP process; write a job description; develop a staffing plan.
  - b) **Interpersonal Skills**: A worker must work with others effectively.
    - i) Participate as a Member of a Team: contribute to group effort.
    - ii) Teach Others New Skills.
    - iii) Serve Clients/Customers: work to satisfy customer's expectations.

- iv) Exercise Leadership: communicate ideas to justify position, persuade and convince others, responsibly challenge existing procedures and policies.
- v) Negotiate: work toward agreements involving exchange of resources, resolve divergent interests.
- vi) Work with Diversity: work well with men and women from diverse backgrounds. Examples: collaborate with a group member to solve a problem; work through a group conflict situation, train a colleague; deal with a dissatisfied customer in person; select and use appropriate leadership styles; use effective delegation techniques; conduct an individual or team negotiation; demonstrate an understanding of how people from different cultural backgrounds might behave in various situations.
- c) **Information**: A worker must be able to acquire and use information.
  - i) Acquire and Evaluate Information.
  - ii) Organize and Maintain Information.
  - iii) Interpret and Communicate Information.
  - iv) Use Computers to Process Information.

Examples: research and collect data from various sources; develop a form to collect data; develop an inventory record-keeping system; produce a report using graphics; make an oral presentation using various media; use on-line computer data bases to research a report; use a computer spreadsheet to develop a budget.

- d) **Systems**: A worker must understand complex interrelationships.
  - i) Understand Systems: know how social, organizational, and technological systems work and operate effectively with them.
  - ii) Monitor and Correct Performance: distinguish trends, predict impacts on system operations, diagnose deviations in systems' performance and correct malfunctions.
  - iii) Improve or Design Systems: suggest modifications to existing systems and develop new or alternative systems to improve performance.

Examples: draw and interpret an organizational chart; develop a monitoring process; choose a situation needing improvement, break it down, examine it, propose an improvement, and implement it.

- e) **Technology**: A worker must be able to work with a variety of technologies.
  - i) Select Technology: choose procedures, tools or equipment including computers and related technologies.
  - ii) Apply Technologies to Task: understand overall intent and proper procedures for setup and operation of equipment.
  - iii) Maintain and Troubleshoot Equipment: Prevent, identify, or solve problems with equipment, including computers and other technologies.

Examples: read equipment descriptions and technical specifications to select equipment to meet needs; set up and assemble appropriate equipment from instructions; read and follow directions for troubleshooting and repairing equipment.
