Instructional Goals and Purposes:

The purpose of this course is to provide learners with the skills, knowledge, and creativity to create drawings.

Learning Outcomes:

After studying all materials and resources presented in the course, the student will be able to:

1. Describe visual subjects through the use of accurate and sensitive observation. 2. Generate drawings which demonstrate descriptive, expressive, and conceptual approaches.
3. Utilize varied materials and techniques with informed aesthetic and conceptual strategies.
4. Demonstrate an appropriate level of professional practice, including safety, craft and presentation.
5. Analyze and critique drawings verbally and in writing.
6. Relate drawing to design, art history and contemporary artists.

Course Content:

A general description of lecture/discussion topics included in this course are listed in the Learning Outcomes section of this syllabus.

Students in all sections of this course will learn the following content:

1. Students will complete gesture and line drawings.
2. Students will create drawings using varied shading techniques
3. Students will use the principles in creating a strong composition.
4. Students will demonstrate ways of creating texture in drawings.
5. Students will practice their drawing by maintaining a drawing journal during the semester.
6. Students will experience varied drawing tools-pencil, chalk, charcoal, pastels, paper stumps...
7. Students will demonstrate the use of one, two, and three point perspective.
8. Students will demonstrate the use of proportion in portrait drawing.

9. Students will critique their work in a group setting.
10. Students will exhibit their work in an exhibition setting.
11. Students will review examples of design, art history and contemporary artists.

Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery:

Face to Face Setting: Lecture, Demonstration, Hands-on, Critique, videos

Major Assignments / Assessments:

The following items will be assigned and assessed during the semester and used to calculate the student's final grade.

Assignments

- Students will submit a drawing journal during the semester,
- Participate in a Group Critique verbally and written.
- Exhibit work in an exhibition setting.
- Students will view and study works of art by artists from history and contemporary as related to their own personal work.

Assessment(s):

- Students will be assessed on the following assignments: Modeling of shapes, Perspective, Contour and Cross-contour line drawings, Gesture drawings, Portrait Drawing
- Students will be evaluated on their individual progress in the areas of creativity, technique, and completed assignments.
- Students will not be compared to others with previous experience.
