Instructional Goals and Purposes:

The purpose of this course is to provide learners with the skills, knowledge, and creativity to create an oil painting.

Learning Outcomes: [from the ACGM catalog]

After studying all materials and resources presented in the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Application of advanced painting techniques.
- 2. Application of the Visual Elements and Principles of Design in their work.
- 3. Demonstrate advance knowledge of materials and tools used for oil paintings.
- 4. Demonstrate strong composition in each of their paintings.
- 5. Demonstrate a personal means of creative expression.

Course Content:

Students in all sections of this course will learn the following content:

- 1. Learners will demonstrate how to create a sense of depth in paintings using perspective, overlapping, color variation, texture, transparent glaze, and chiaroscuro techniques.
- 2. Learners will paint on conventional painting surfaces such as cotton canvas, masonite, and textured paper.
- 3. Learners will create a strong composition using the Visual Element and principles of Design.
- 4. Learners will apply their knowledge of color mixing to their work.
- 5. Learners will show creativity in their work.
- 6. Learners will paint traditional subject matter with an emphasis on the human figure.
- 7. Learners will participate in a group critique.
- 8. Learners will study past artists and their work.
- 9. Learners will exhibit at the end of the semester.

Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery: This course is offered in a face-to-face setting. Instruction will be by lecture, power points, demonstration, group critique, and hands-on experience.

Major Assignments / Assessments:

The following items will be assigned and assessed during the semester and used to calculate the student's final grade.

Assignments/Assessments;

Learners will be assessed on the following assignments:

Traditional subjects with an emphasis on the human figure.

Learners will be evaluated on their individual progress in the areas of creativity, technique, and completed assignments. Learners will not be compared to others with previous experience. Rubrics will be followed for paintings assignment.

Areas of evaluation: Composition, Use of Visual Elements and Principles of Design, Creativity, and Quality of work.
