Course Content:

- 3. Studio lighting for photography.
- 4. PhotoShop software as a tool for creative photography.
- 5. Resources online for studying and viewing creative photography techniques.

Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery:

This course is offered in the traditional classroom for lectures, discussions and audiovisual presentations. This course utilizes Adobe PhotoShop software on the computers in the lab, and the studio lights in the adjacent studio.

Major Assignments / Assessments:

The following items will be assigned and assessed during the semester and used to calculate the student's final grade.

Assignments

- 1. Photographs in various categories, including creative expression.
- 2. Report on careers in photography.
- 3. Report on famous photographer.
- 4. Final exhibit photograph.
- 5. Compiled photo portfolio or multimedia presentation.

Assessment(s):

- 1. Assignment grades.
- 2. Portfolio grade.
- 3. Final exhibit grade.
