**Catalog Description:** Exploration and further training within the basic principles and tools of acting, including an emphasis on critical analysis of oneself and others. The tools include ensemble performing, character and script analysis, and basic theater terminology. This will continue the exploration of the development of the actor's instrument: voice, body and imagination.

## Instructional Goals and Purposes:

The purpose of this course is to further focus on the physical, mental, and vocal aspects of acting. Techniques used will focus on scene breakdown and scoring, character analysis, and the physicalization of character objectives, obstacles, actions, and environmental influences as well as audition techniques. Extended use of visceral understanding of the principles of intention and relationship in the crafting of a deeply personal, physically engaged analyses of scenes.
