## Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery:

This class will present the course material through Canvas. Students are expected to read the chapters in the book, take quizzes, complete written assignments, complete proctored exams, and prepare a PowerPoint capstone assignment.

Major assignments include proctored exams and a PowerPoint campstone assignment.

1. Read text content \& watch videos assigned by module.
2. Take quizzes assigned by module.
3. Create written response to a question, topic, or picture by module.
