

Course Syllabus

SPAN 1412 – Beginning Spanish II

Catalog Description: Continued development of basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the high beginner to low intermediate level.

Prerequisites: Spanish 1411 or high school Spanish

Semester Credit Hours: 4 Lecture Hours per Week: 3 Lab Hours per Week: 3 Contact Hours per Semester: 96

Class section meeting time: Online—students are expected to spend at least 6-9 hours per week reading, reviewing, and participating in assigned activities for successful completion of this course.

Instructional Goals and Purposes:

This course will emphasize the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing, as well as an appreciation of Hispanic culture. To develop these skills to the best of the student's ability, active participation by the student is required. This course is intended to teach basic vocabulary and grammar of beginning level Spanish.

Learning Outcomes: [from the ACGM catalog]

After studying all materials and resources presented in the course, the student will be able to:

1. Engage in conversations using level-appropriate grammatical structures including narrating events that take place in the past.

2. Demonstrate understanding of level-appropriate spoken Spanish produced by Spanish speakers of diverse origins.

3. Write simple to moderately complex sentences using level-appropriate grammatical structures and organize them into cohesive paragraphs.

4. Read and comprehend level-appropriate authentic texts.

5. Identify and discuss traditions, customs and values of the Hispanic world.

6. Compare and contrast the traditions, customs and values of the Hispanic word with characteristics of their own culture.

Course Content:

Students in all sections of this course will learn the following content:

1. vocabulary including food groups, writing and written materials, directions, more family members, weather, changes in states and conditions, parts of a house, domestic appliances, more descriptive adjectives

- 2. review of regular and irregular present tense
- 3. object pronouns
- 4. more on using adjectives
- 5. verbs used reflexively and nonreflexively, gustar and verbs like it
- 6. present and past progressive
- 7. imperfect
- 8. preterit
- 9. using preterit and imperfect together
- 10. por and para, affirmative and negative words
- 11. tener and idioms, comparisons, estar + adjectives

Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery:

Instruction for this course will be achieved through the use of lecture, discussion, video, student presentations and Canvas.

Assessment:

Reading:

1. students will answer questions in the reading comprehension section of each written test and the final exam

2. students will complete internet activities over Spanish websites

Listening:

3. students will answer questions in the listening comprehension section of each written test responding to audio materials in various formats that use the vocabulary and grammatical structures previously covered

4. students will also answer questions about their conversations

Writing:

- 5. students will write in different situations including dialogues, descriptions and narratives
- 6. students will write using different modes of expression as part of each written test and final exam **Speaking:**
- 7. students will demonstrate their mastery of vocabulary and grammar by oral quizzes and presentations
- 8. pronunciation will be evaluated during conversations in class

Cultural Awareness:

9. students will respond to videos about the various Spanish-speaking countries

10. students will give oral reports to the class over some aspect of Spanish (folklore, literature, fine arts, etc.)

Course Grade:

The grade for this course will be based on study plans, quizzes, and exams. The final exam is comprehensive. Tests will be frequent and given at the end of each unit. Lecture counts 75% of the overall grade and lab counts 25%. (Study plans 25%, Quizzes 20%, Exams 30%, and Lab 25%).
