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# President's Message

2021 – 2022 saw a continuation of the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic. The year concluded with the college having spent a cumulative total of 29 months making every effort to respond to the pandemic and continue our mission of educating students. Student enrollment and the number of students living on campus declined 12 percent since the beginning of the pandemic.

On a positive note, for the eleventh consecutive year *The Chronicle of Higher Education* recognized Panola College as a Great College to Work For. We were one of four colleges in the United States in our category to make the Honor Roll. Panola College Received the Government Finance Officers Association Certificate for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 26th consecutive year.

The newly constructed Frances B. Ross Music Building opened in January 2022 much to the excitement of music faculty and students. The College looks forward to celebrating its 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary with numerous events (Laser light show, Gala, Featured Alumni Event, and the publication of Bill O'Neal's book "75 years along the Pony Trail: Panola College, 1947 – 2022."


Other items of note during 2021– 2022 included:

- Provided more than 1.137 million hours of instruction to 6,236 students
- 462 laptops were purchased for faculty, staff, and student use
- 45% of students at Panola College enrolled in technical workforce or healthcare programs
- An independent audit resulted in an unqualified "clean" report
- Gifts to Panola College and the Panola College Foundation exceeded \$1,000,000
- The value of Endowed Scholarships exceeded 10.6 million dollars
- Began new instructional programs in Patient Care Technology and Cyber Security
- Filly Lane and Pony Trail (the roads entering the college from W. Panola) were demolished and reconstructed with concrete and new lighting
- Eighty-five new HVAC Units installed
- Two Hundred light fixtures converted to LED
- Additional trees planted and enhanced campus landscaping
- New Electronic Sign installed
- New Pavilion constructed in the Quad

- Panola College unveiled a new Website
- New Phone System installed

# Panola College Distance Learning



## Distance Learning 2021-2022

Panola College was back in full swing for the 21-22 school year and with that came changes in Distance Learning. Teresa Brooks, Dean of Distance Learning, retired after 16 years at Panola College. Texas Reardon was named Director of Distance and Digital Learning.



The year also saw a return of in-person testing at the academic testing lab. After being closed due to COVID, the testing center welcomed back students. More than 500 students used the center during the year. The lab also saw some upgrades. New dividers separated test takers and lockable lockers allowed students to safely store their belongings.

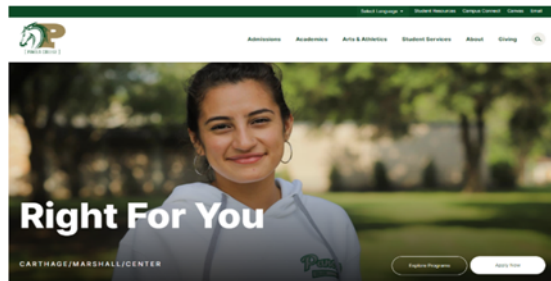
The Distance Learning (DL) department continued to support instruction in four basic modes of delivery: face-to-face, online, hybrid (a blend of face-to-face and online), and interactive video via Zoom videoconferencing. The DL department also provided training and technical support for other technology, including Canvas, Turnitin, Dropout Detective, Microsoft Office, Google Tools, JotForm, YouTube, and other tools used by instructors to keep their classes available to all their students.



## Distance Learning Projects

### Panola College Website

The 2021 school year started off with a big change. After two years, countless hours, and many meetings – the Panola College website redesign launched officially. The new site, designed by Encore Multimedia, came with a sleeker and cleaner look designed with the students in mind. New categories and a homepage allowed students to access student resources, classes, and important content easier.



According to Google Analytics, the new site is on pace to be viewed more in the 2021-2022 school year than the previous year.



## OneButtonStudio (OBS)

New this year to the Digital Learning Department was the addition of the OneButtonStudio (OBS). Purchased through HEERF Funds, the OBS, is a full studio setup designed for those with no studio experience and is literally One Button. The OneButtonStudio allows faculty, students, and staff to record videos for lectures, assignments, or for promotion. The OBS saw more than 80 sessions scheduled during its first year. Without the need of limited assistance, faculty and staff can schedule the use of the studio at any time.

## OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ASSISTANT



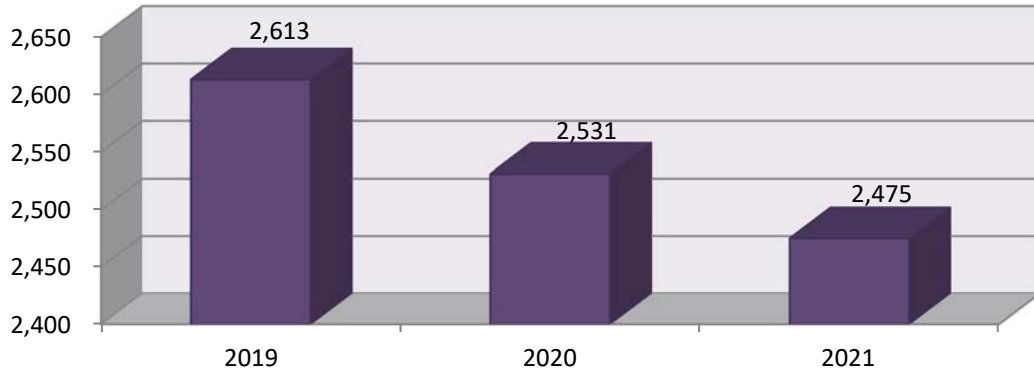

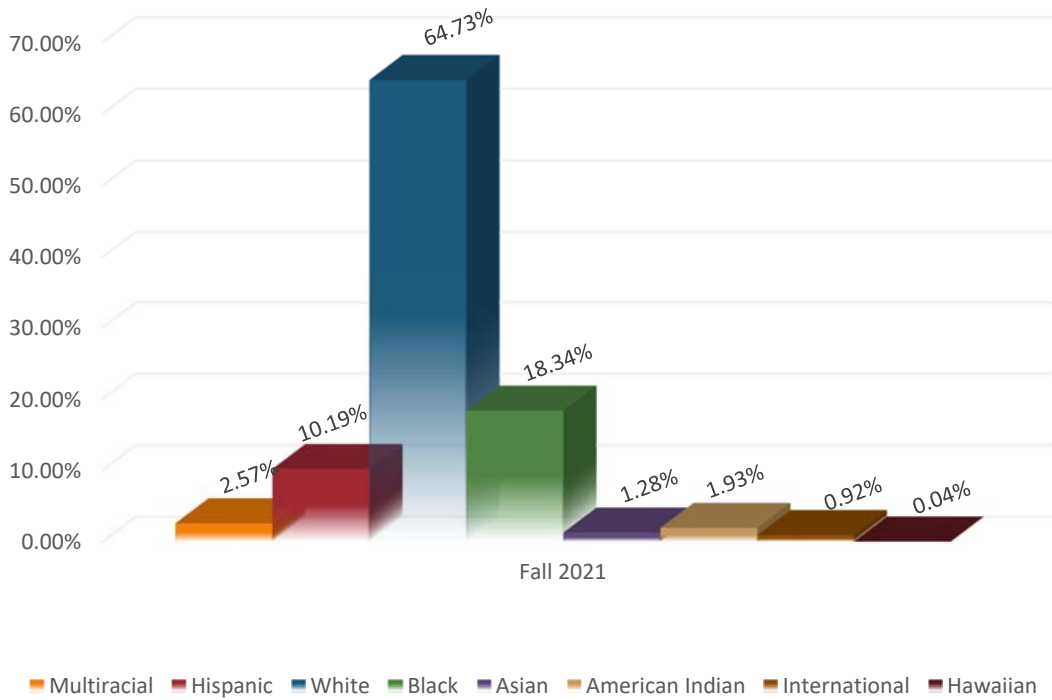

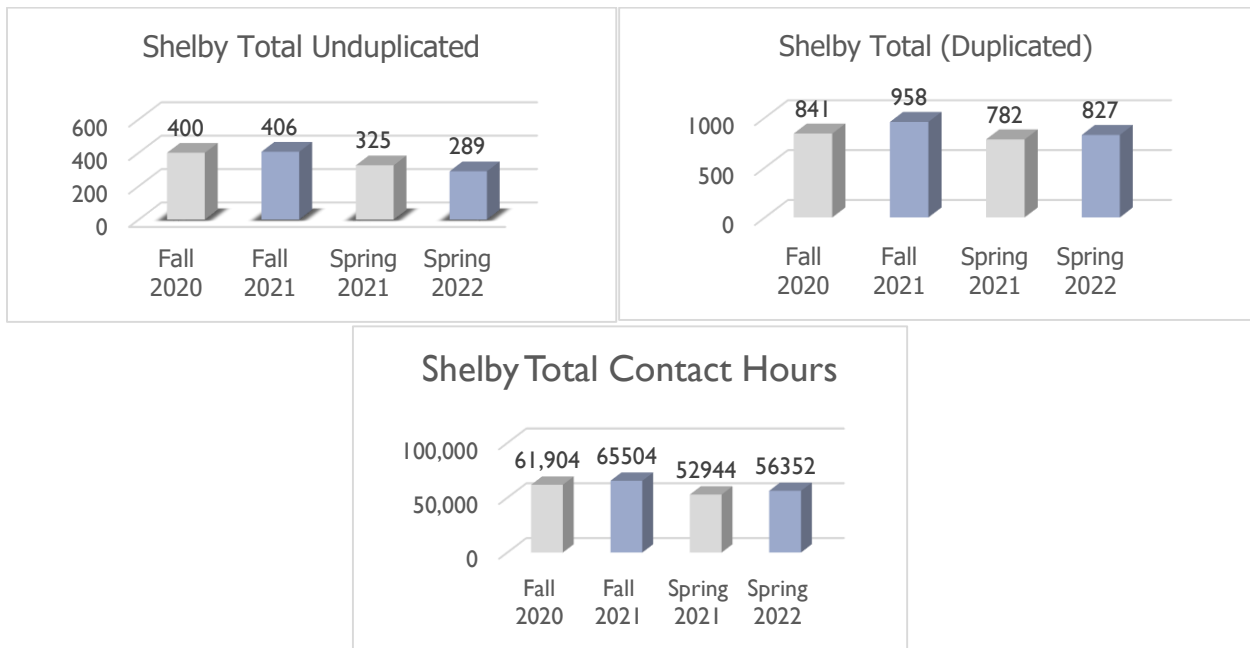
**Shelby County Program and Continuing Education Classes**

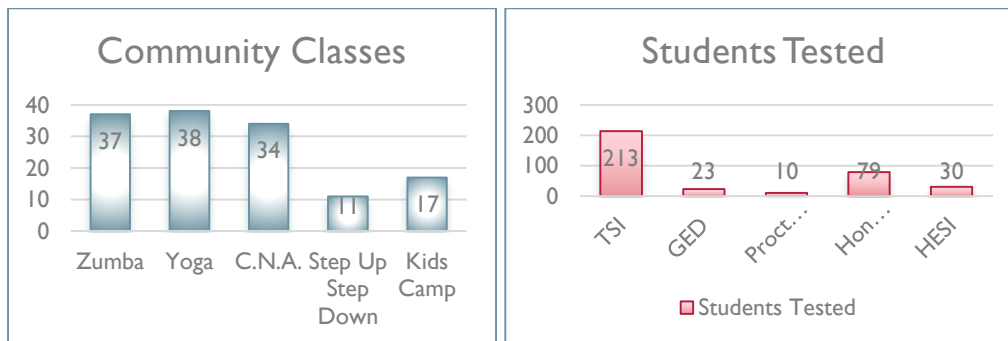
## **Shelby County Enrollment**

Students that live in Shelby County have the convenience of enrolling in technical, academic, or workforce development programs close to home. Enrollment numbers below include the total number of students enrolled at SRTC, SCC, and Shelby County Dual Credit Locations for Fall and Spring. There was no summer enrollment to report at SRTC and SCC this academic year (online courses are not assigned to Shelby County location). In the Fall of 2021 Shelby County increased the unduplicated student count by 1.5%, student contact hours by 5.8%, and the duplicated student count by 13.9%. In the Spring semester, unduplicated student count went down but contact hours increased by 6.44% while the duplicated student count increased by 5.75%.



## **Community Classes and Student Testing**

Zumba, Yoga, and Certified Nurses Courses serve to enrich the community of Shelby County. This year we also partnered with 4-H to offer Step UP Step Down and a summer camp for children in the 3<sup>rd</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade. Many students also test at Shelby Regional Training Center (TSI, welding, or course testing) or at Shelby College Center (GED, HESI, or select course testing).

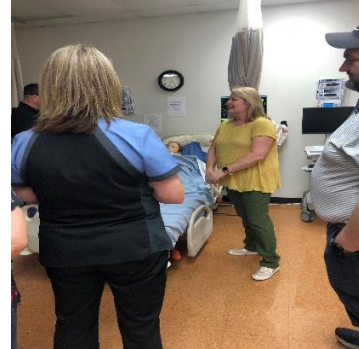

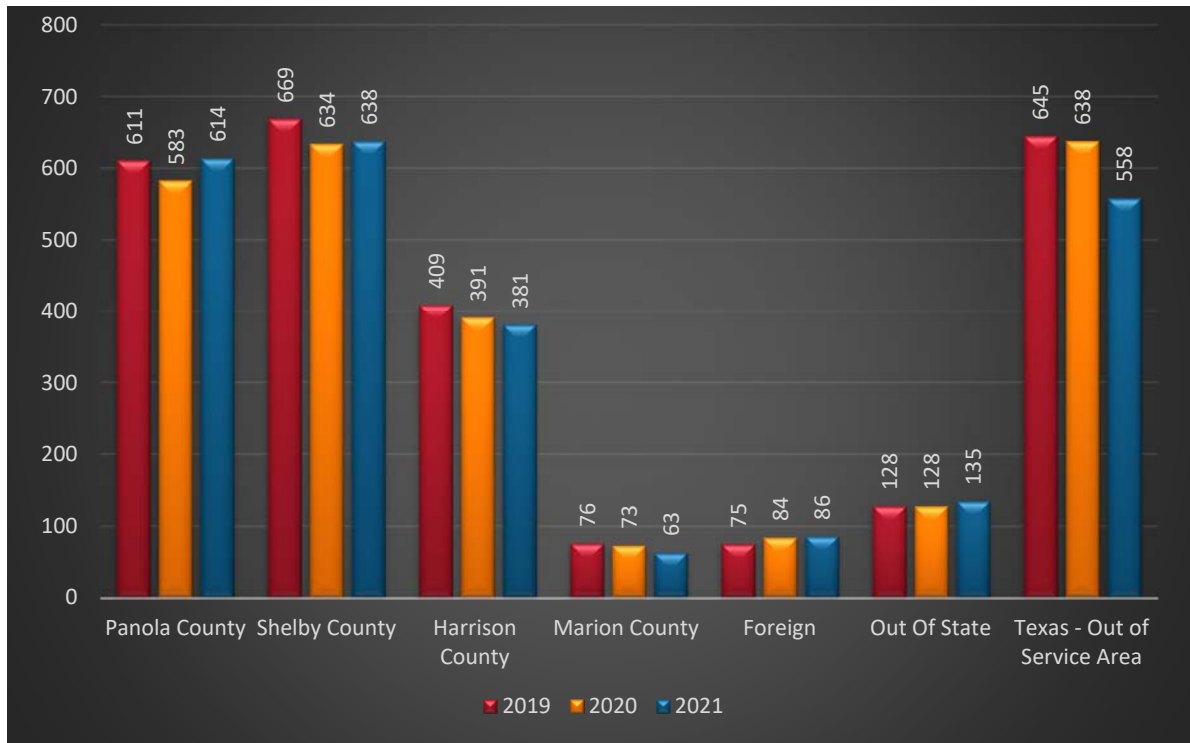

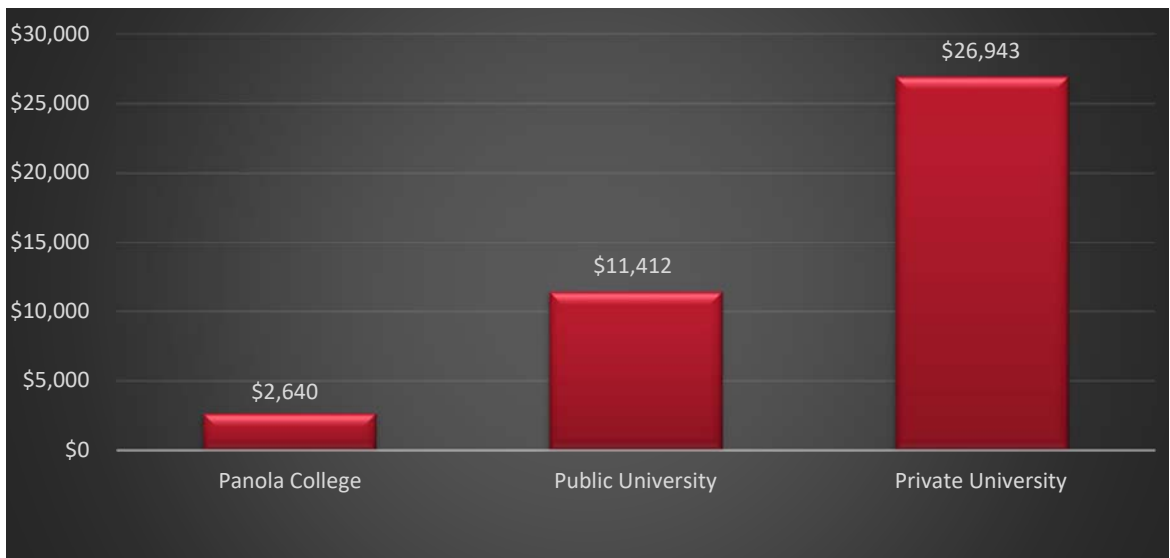

## Occupational Therapy Assistant (OTA) Program

### Program Success & Student Success

The OTA program continues its accredited program status with the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE). The next site visit is anticipated to be in June 2023.

OTA students are well-prepared for the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT) exam with 87% of new graduates passing the exam in 2021. All OTA students (19/19) who entered fieldwork in 2021 successfully completed fieldwork and graduated from the program as a result of this diligence and teamwork!

### OTA Enrollment

- The OTA program continued to see maximum program enrollment in Fall 2021.

### OTA Community Involvement

- **Baker-Koonce Life Lab** – continued its very popular six (6) week social emotional learning program - OTA students were buddies for approximately 220 fourth grade students.
- **Carthage ISD Annual Special Field Day** - OTA students planned and facilitated therapeutic activities for the which services area students with neurodiversity. All OTA students and faculty participated.
- **All-Inclusive Park/Playground** – OTA Students and faculty were actively involved with the planning and grand-opening of the All-Abilities Park directly across the street from the Health Sciences building. This park serves citizens of all ages and abilities.



OTA faculty worked closely with ADN faculty to plan a cross-over simulation event that involved Panola Drama students who played the role of patients and their family members. This event provided a very rich learning environment for students.





## Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Program

### Program Success

The Panola College EMS program continues to be accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). The next comprehensive evaluation of the program, including an on-site review, is scheduled to occur no later than 2023.

WELCOME! Miranda Hagans is the new Program Chair and joined the EMS program in January 2022. Miranda has a Bachelor of Science in Emergency Medical Sciences and is a Licensed EMT/Paramedic, BLS, ACLS, PALS, PHTLS, AMLS, PEPP, IAED (This means she can teach our students to save lives).

In addition to the current existing Paramedic certificate, a separate EMT-Basic certificate and an Associate of Applied Science, Paramedic – students can enroll for any of these beginning Fall 2022.



Several grants were received to improve the simulation experiences that students receive through the EMS programs. New CPR mannequins, a ventilator, a stretcher, and other very important equipment that students need to know how to operate prior to their clinicals.



Some of the other program highlights include:

- The EMS program became a participating Member of the Regional Advisory Council (RAC) area G.
- Panola College is now a NAEMT (National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians) training site.

## Health Information Technology (HIT) Program

### Program Success

The Health Information Technology (HIT) completed a site visit in 2020 for the Commission on Accreditation for Health Informatics and Information Management Education (CAHIIM). Responses to the site visit were submitted and required changes were made, including appointing a new Program Director, Lynn Hanson.

The HIT program was issued continued accreditation for 6 years and had to submit a progress report to fix all the standards where deficiencies existed. The HIT program is now in full compliance with CAHIIM standards. The next onsite comprehensive program review will be 2027-2028.

The Pathway for Medical Coding has been attractive to two local school districts resulting in a number of new dual credit students enrolling.

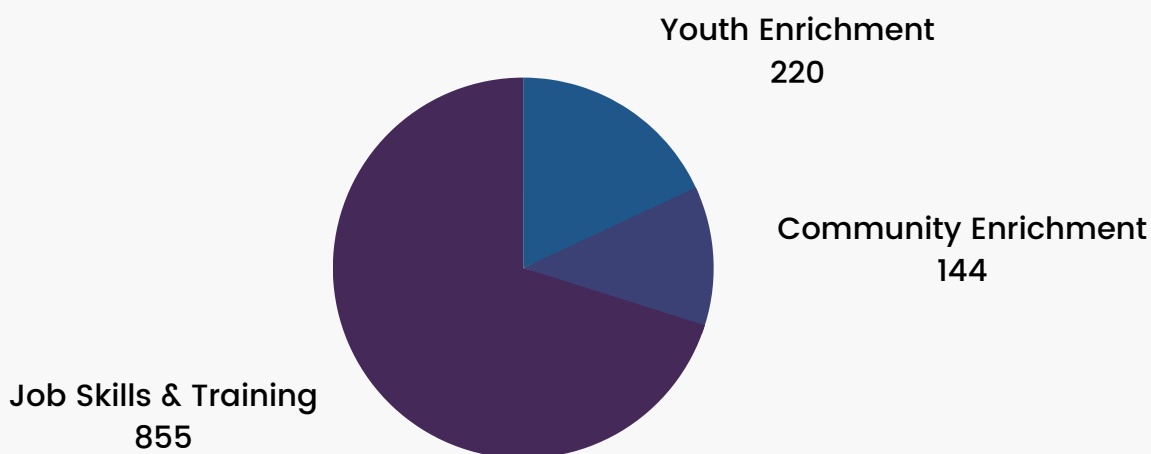


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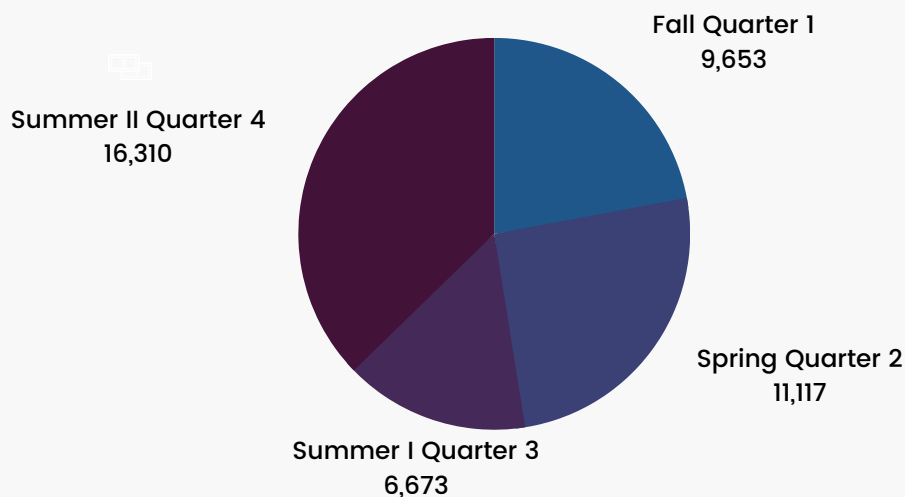
# People Served

## Panola College Receives \$20,000 Donation from The Crain Foundation and R. Lacy Services

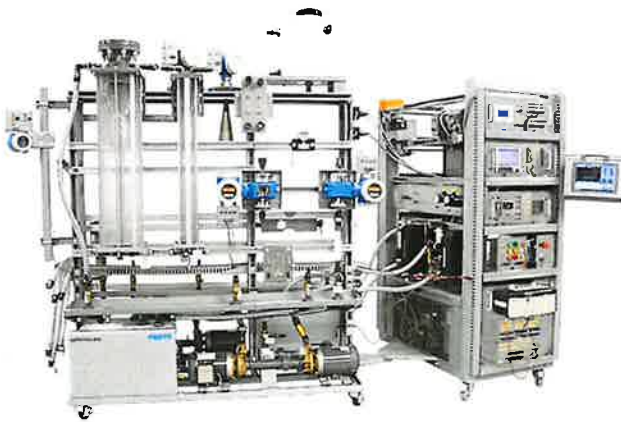
Panola College School of Energy students will begin learning on new portable electrical trainers the program purchased from a \$20,000 donation received from The Crain Foundation and R. Lacy Services. Students will use the new portable electrical trainers for basic and advanced electrical courses in programs such as electrical and instrumentation, residential commercial electrician, natural gas compression, petroleum technology, maintenance technician, and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning.

The new portable electrical units will teach students about electrical AC and DC theory, relay theory, and simple and advanced circuitry. The training units provide opportunities for students to learn how to use a multimeter to measure four different electrical quantities. A variety of switch styles are represented on each unit to familiarize students with common switches found in commercial and residential applications. Light and sound components provide students feedback of their work with visual and auditory representation.



“We are grateful to The Crain Foundation and R. Lacy Services for providing state-of-the-art trainers that allow our students to have hands-on experiences,” said Michael Pace, School of Energy instructor. “The new portable basic electrical trainers enable us to reach more students by carrying the units to any available lab at Panola College Center or Carthage location.”

## Panola College Receives \$107,552 from the Dan L. Duncan Foundation



Panola College School of Energy received a \$107,522 grant from the Dan L. Duncan Foundation in December 2021. The grant funded the purchase of two new instrumentation trainers for the Energy department. The instrumentation trainers serve up to four students per unit. This trainer teaches a wide range of sensors, valves, controllers, and safety procedures used in petrochemical production. The trainers will be utilized in petroleum instrumentation and advanced PLC courses. Students majoring in Electrical and Instrumentation, Natural Gas Compression, and Petroleum Technology will all utilize the equipment in the program.



### Mark Allums Scholarship established at Panola College

Panola College is proud to announce the establishment of the Mark Allums Endowed Scholarship. Ramona Allums established the scholarship in honor of her son, Mark Allums. Allums is a Panola College alumnus, as were his parents, Bob and Ramona Allums.

“This is the third scholarship established by the Allums family,” said Jessica Pace, Vice President of Institutional Advancement. “Every time a student is awarded an Allums, the Allums Family will be remembered with gratitude and appreciation. The Mark Allums scholarship will have a significant impact on students striving to reach their goals for generations to come.”

The Mark Allums Endowed Scholarship will be awarded annually to a freshman or sophomore student at Panola College. The selection of the recipients will be made in the spring of each year.

### Panola College to receive \$122,500 grant in emergency aid for students

Panola College will receive a total of \$122,500 over a three-year period from the Texas Emergency Aid Roadmap grant program. The funds will be distributed to students who face unexpected and untimely crises that could prevent them from completing their education.

The program will require students to complete a brief application, identifying their unanticipated financial emergency. The program is expected to launch on Oct. 1.

“Panola College was selected to participate in the Texas Emergency Aid Roadmap for demonstrating a strong commitment to student success and a thoughtful approach to meeting students’ needs,” said Leslie Gurrola, the Director of Programs and Strategy for Greater Texas Foundation. “We’re excited to extend the reach and impact of the good work that is already happening here.”

The Texas Emergency Aid Roadmap is a three-year, \$1.5 million grant program funded by Greater Texas Foundation to help ten community colleges across Texas develop efficient, equitable, and sustainable emergency aid programs to ensure students receive the support they need to persist through financial crises. Panola College was one of ten Texas community colleges selected to receive the grant.

Greater Texas Foundation supports efforts to ensure all Texas students are prepared for, have access to, persist in, and complete a postsecondary education. Since its inception in 2001, the Foundation has approved over \$100 million in grants to support Texas students.

“Throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, our students’ financial challenges have increased,” said Jessica Pace, the Vice President of Institutional Advancement at Panola College. “In fact, on our most recent financial wellness survey, 63 percent of our students indicated that their family’s finances have worsened since before the pandemic. With this grant, we hope to establish a permanent emergency funding program to support our students and help them stay on their educational journeys.”

In 2019, Panola College began working toward assisting students in emergency situations by establishing the Feed the Need comfort closet program. Aimed at helping those who may be experiencing basic living insecurities, the program has served nearly 400 students.

“Some crises affect entire communities; others are personal. Either way, the effects on students can be devastating,” said Sue McMillin, President and CEO of Greater Texas Foundation. “The Texas Emergency Aid Roadmap program is designed to help colleges be there for their students no matter what crisis they’re facing.”

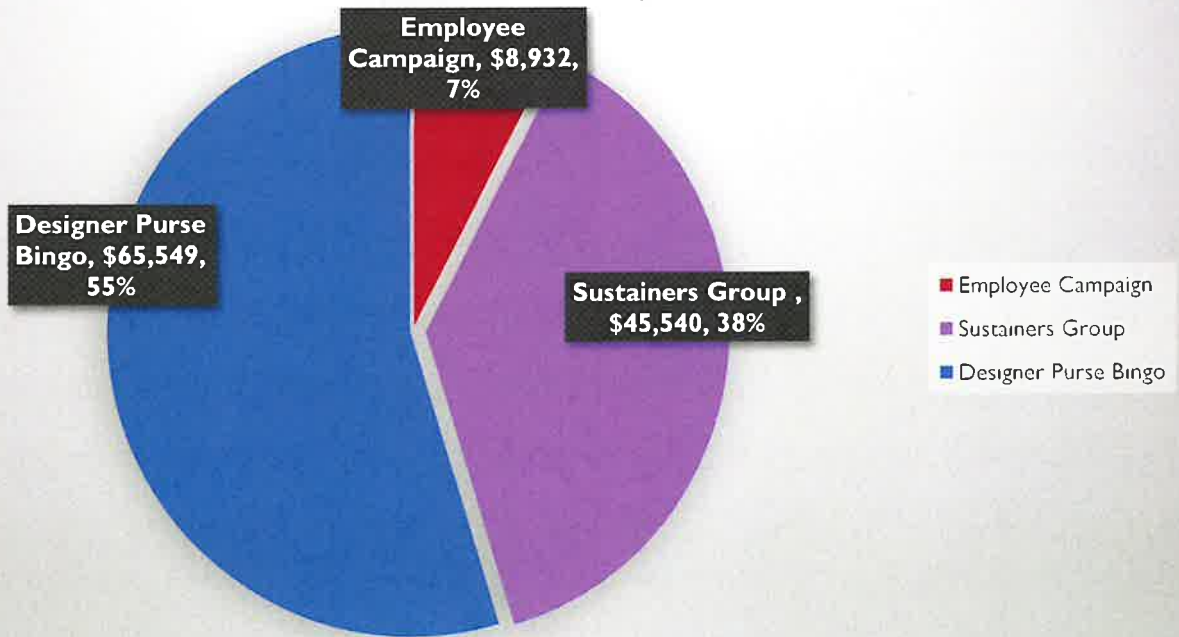

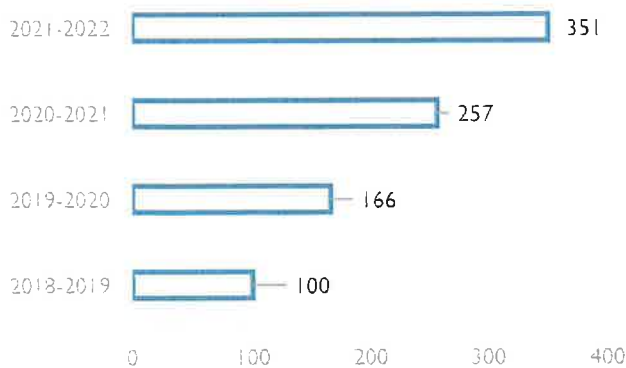
## Panola College & Panola College Foundation Endowments

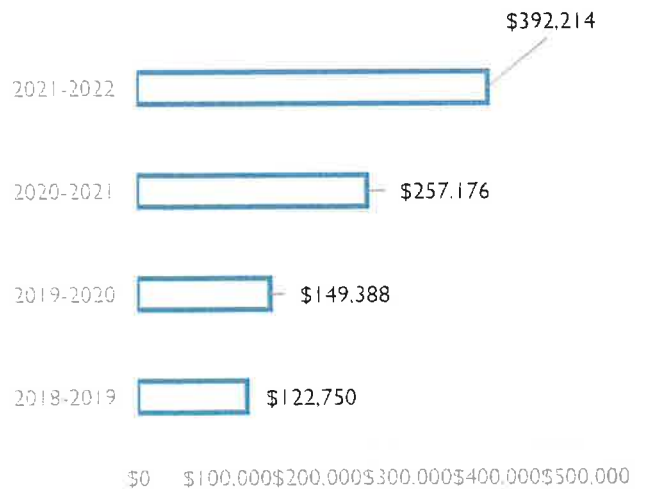
### August 2022 Endowment Total



### Number of Scholarships Awarded



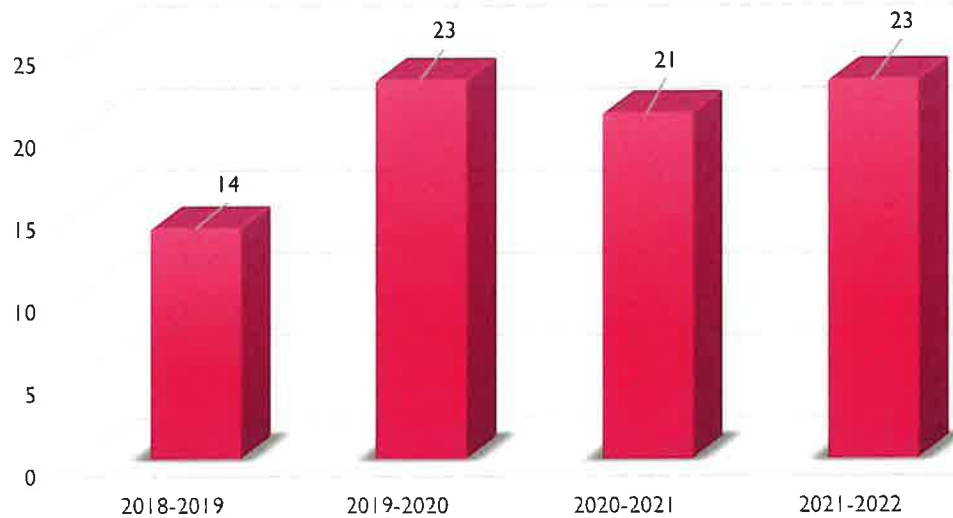
### Scholarship Amount Awarded

Isn't it funny how much better we do at things we love?"



Linda Davis left Panola College to pursue her singing career in Nashville, Tennessee where she began her climb to success. In 1993, Linda released a chart-topping duet with Reba McEntire, "Does He Love You," that won both artists several awards including a Grammy for Best Country Vocal Collaboration. Since then, Linda has gone on to record nine albums, 10 videos, and has made countless television appearances. She has played to sold-out crowds with numerous country artists

such as Garth Brooks, Reba McEntire, Kenny Rogers, and George Strait. Linda was honored with the Music City Christian Fellowship Candlelight Award in 2007 and was inducted into the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame in 2009. A desire to pass on techniques of the trade, her business experience, and to foster confidence in aspiring new artists led Linda to create her own coaching business, Stage Performance 101.

In 1984, Linda married fellow musician and entrepreneur, Lang Scott. Together, they have two daughters, Hillary Scott Tyrrell and Rylee Jean Scott, and three beautiful granddaughters. In 2016, Linda, Lang, Hillary, and Rylee released a critically acclaimed, two-time Grammy-winning album, Hillary Scott & The Scott Family - Love Remains. The faith-based project debuted #1 on Billboard's Top Christian Albums chart and debuted at #2 on the Top Country Albums chart.

"I am so thankful for this life I get to live," stated Linda. "As a young girl, I could never have imagined the fullness of the life I enjoy today. Since moving to Nashville in 1982, the opportunities and experiences I have had throughout my career continue to blow my mind as well as humble me with gratitude. All I know is that if I can set goals and dreams and then realize those goals, other Panola College students can too."

When reflecting on being awarded the 2021 Panola College Alumna of the Year, Linda wanted to express her heartfelt appreciation to the following people: her parents, Milford and Oneita Davis; her siblings, Troy and Vernell; her uncle, Turner Britton; her pageant manager and friend, Berneice Blair; her high school choir director, June Lewis; and her Panola College choir teacher, Larry Brumley.

Linda says that without the support and encouragement of the aforementioned family members and mentors, she would have never had the courage and confidence to pursue a career as a recording artist, nor would she have been able to live out her childhood dreams.

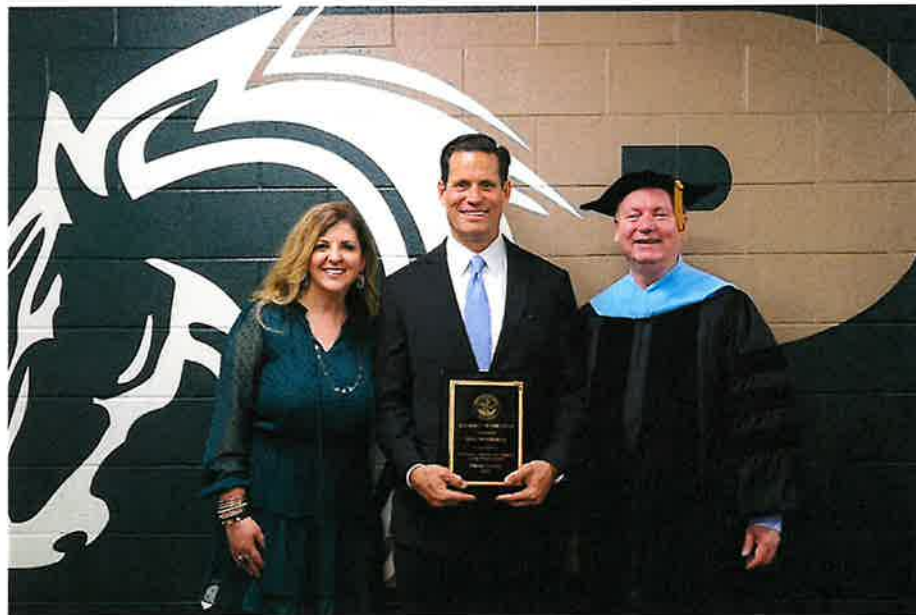

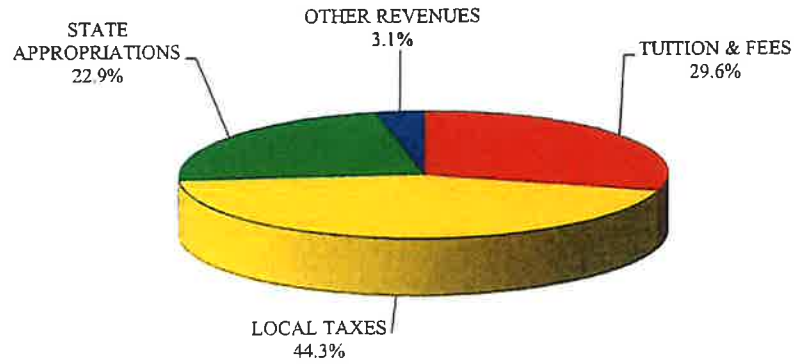

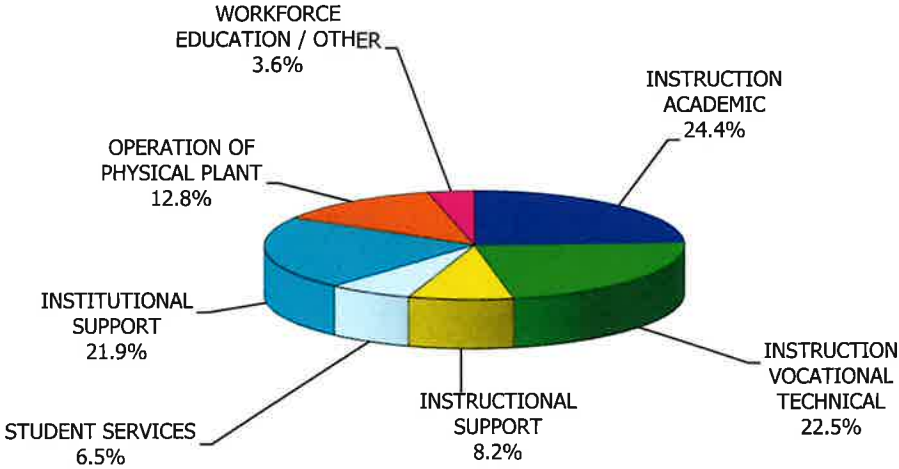
